

**Executive Summary Regarding Nancy Ann CLARK,
also known as Nancy Ann GREEK, and Nancy JASPER**

Date Last Seen: 1991-08-22, at approximately midnight:

Reported Missing: 1991-08-23

BACKGROUND of Nancy CLARK

Nancy CLARK was a sex trade worker, reliably known to be active in the City of Victoria. Some associates stated that she worked on the street part time and occasionally full time, largely to bring in extra money for her children. There is currently no history of her at any time frequenting the Downtown Eastside of Vancouver. CLARK was occasionally secretive about her involvement in prostitution. However she had been observed in the Victoria sex trade for at least a year prior to her disappearance.

CLARK often worked alone, in the area of Gordon and Courtenay Street in Victoria. She has been characterized as not very intelligent, and as "a person who could be easily led." CLARK was described as being an alcoholic, a regular marijuana smoker, and a woman who was starting to use cocaine on a recreational basis. She apparently was not addicted to any particular drug, and she has no criminal record on file.

CLARK was an active social person, who was in regular contact with an assortment of friends and associates. She was well known to other sex trade workers, and had a reputation for being a "party girl." At the time of CLARK's disappearance on 1991-08-22, she lived with her two female children, **CI-PERS** and **CI-PERS**. The family received monthly support from the Ministry of Human Resources (MHR). These

Street and stopped. CLARK got out of the vehicle at that point, and walked back to the corner where CUZNER was standing. CLARK told CUZNER that the male wanted her to go to his place for \$70.00.

CUZNER did not see CLARK get any other dates that night. CUZNER stated that she went home about three times that night, coming back to the street for the last time at around 0225 hours. She did not see CLARK at that time and has not seen her since.

NOTE: PICKTON would be 42 years of age at the time. Although, the identify of the person described cannot be confirmed, the practice of getting a sex trade worker to come back to "his residence" is consistent with PICKTON's contact with prostitutes.

During the trial of Robert PICKTON, admissions were made on 2007-07-12 in regards to Crown witnesses STW 17304 and VIC97 VIC97

The admitted evidence of VIC 97 was that she was a sex trade worker on the Downtown East side of Vancouver, British Columbia. In the late evening hours of March 22, 1997 she was standing on the corner of Princess Avenue and Cordova Street in the Downtown East Side of Vancouver when she was approached by PICKTON. PICKTON was driving a red pickup truck and was the only occupant in the vehicle. VIC 97 offered sexual services to PICKTON at a price of \$40. PICKTON then asked VIC 97 to go to his residence and he offered payment of \$100. VIC 97 told PICKTON that his residence was too far and that she could provide the services as a location close by. PICKTON advised VIC 97 that he would drive her back to Vancouver. VIC 97 agreed to attend to PICKTON's residence. VIC 97 travelled to a trailer, located at 953 Dominion Avenue, Port Coquitlam. Aside from VIC 97 and PICKTON there was no one else present in the trailer and nor did VIC 97 see any other person at 953 Dominion Avenue. Inside PICKTON's residence, VIC 97 and PICKTON went into a bedroom at the end of the hallway. VIC 97 was paid the \$100 and they had sexual intercourse.

The admitted evidence of [STW 17904] is that in the fall of 1999 she was addicted to narcotics and working as a sex trade worker in the Kingsway and Joyce Street area of East Vancouver. In the early morning hours, [REDACTED] was working by hitch hiking at the corner of Joyce Street and Kingsway in Vancouver when she was approached by Robert PICKTON. PICKTON was driving a dark coloured pickup truck and was the only occupant in the vehicle. [REDACTED] and PICKTON had a discussion and [REDACTED] offered to provide sexual services to PICKTON in exchange for money. [REDACTED] inquired if PICKTON was agreeable to receiving sexual services in his vehicle. PICKTON responded that he did not want to get caught by the police in his truck and that he would rather they went to his residence. PICKTON told [REDACTED] that he would drive her back to East Vancouver.

[REDACTED] and PICKTON agreed to a payment of \$100 to attend 953 Dominion Avenue. [REDACTED] attended the trailer, and performed fellatio for PICKTON. After completion of the act, PICKTON paid her another \$50. There was discussion between PICKTON and [REDACTED] of her working security duties at the property for \$800 per month, plus room and board. The next day [REDACTED] telephoned PICKTON asking if he wanted another date, however, he was too busy. [REDACTED] then asked PICKTON for money, and PICKTON later that day met her in East Vancouver and gave her \$40.

Giselle IRESON also testified during the PICKTON trial on 2007-05-31. She identified PICKTON in court, and described how in late 1998 she encountered him in the Downtown Eastside. PICKTON discussed doing a date with her, and tried to persuade her to go to his farm in Port Coquitlam. IRESON turned him down, because of the distance involved. Note that this witness is now deceased.

On 2007-06-18 [STW 1421] testified at the PICKTON trial under the name of [REDACTED] after a publication ban of her real identity was ordered. [STW 1421] told the court that at one time she was a drug addict and sex trade worker in the Downtown Eastside of Vancouver.

[STW 1421] stated that on an evening in 2001, possibly during the month of August,

she was outside of the Pennsylvania Hotel on Carrall Street. She was suffering from drug withdrawal symptoms at the time. [REDACTED] was approached by a female whom she recognized from the street, and whom she later identified as Dinah TAYLOR. After a conversation, [REDACTED] followed TAYLOR on foot to an orange flat bed truck, that was parked about a minute away.

[REDACTED] observed TAYLOR in conversation with a male, who was alone in the truck at the time. TAYLOR received \$80.00 dollars from the driver, and TAYLOR then gave \$60.00 of this sum to [REDACTED]. TAYLOR and [REDACTED] returned to the corner at Carrall and Hastings Streets to buy drugs. The male remained in the vehicle. [REDACTED] later in her testimony identified this male as Robert PICKTON.

[REDACTED] returned to the truck, and PICKTON drove her up Pender Street close to the Regent Hotel. [REDACTED] went to the area of the street outside of the Regent Hotel and purchased more drugs. She then returned again to where the truck had been parked. [REDACTED] found PICKTON in the truck, still parked at the same location.

[REDACTED] accompanied PICKTON in his truck, and they drove up Hastings Street. [REDACTED] noted that some landmarks they passed were consistent with the route to the Maple Ridge Treatment Centre. PICKTON told her that he would give her some more money in the morning, and drive her back to Vancouver.

PICKTON drove [REDACTED] to a small shack or trailer, in an area that was very dark. Once inside, she noticed a small office area, and a lot of women's clothes.

[REDACTED] also noted a large quantity of women's cosmetic products in the bathroom. [REDACTED] undressed to her underwear and gave PICKTON a massage. She stated that she had no further sexual contact with PICKTON.

[REDACTED] fell asleep and woke up in the morning to the sounds of construction. PICKTON wasn't in the trailer at that point, but he soon returned. [REDACTED] went

outside and noted that the construction noise was coming from what appeared to be some nearby condominiums. PICKTON drove [REDACTED] back to Vancouver, to the Patricia Hotel. He dropped her off and gave her thirty or forty dollars.

PERSONS of INTEREST

[REDACTED] was identified as a person of interest, during the Victoria Police Department investigation into the disappearance of Nancy CLARK. Witnesses including [REDACTED] CI-PERS, and [REDACTED] CI-PERS have advised that CLARK talked about being assaulted by him, and they observed that she was apparently terrified of him.

[REDACTED] has an extensive criminal record that includes convictions for robbery, firearms, and property offences. He was prohibited from possessing firearms dating back to 1991 in Victoria. His DNA profile is held in the National DNA Data Bank.

[REDACTED] was interviewed in 1991 by members of the Victoria Police Department, and again in 2007 by the Missing Women Task Force. In 1991 [REDACTED] stated that he had spent the night of 1991-08-22 with his girlfriend, Victoria YOUNKER. (Note that YOUNKER was a sex trade worker who was found murdered in the Chilliwack area in October 1995. [REDACTED] was in jail when YOUNKER was murdered). He may have seen CLARK on the Wednesday (21st) or Thursday night (22nd). He recalled seeing her, "on the corner with Paige (CUZNER)." (CUZNER advised in her statement that CLARK was with her on the corner of Gordon and Courtney Streets on the evening of 1991-08-22.) [REDACTED] had spoken with CUZNER that night, but he added that he had no contact with CLARK at the time. [REDACTED] described previous difficulties that he had with CLARK. She had lived in the same house with [REDACTED] and his wife in 1985. [REDACTED] alleged that CLARK had more than once falsely stated to his wife that
